Bullying definition - typically a form of repeated, persistent, and aggressive behaviour directed at an individual or individuals that is intended to cause (or ought reasonably to be known to cause) fear and distress and/or harm to another person's body, feelings, self-esteem, or reputation. Bullying occurs in a context where there is either a real or a perceived power imbalance. This includes any form of electronic communication of this nature.	A child who is the target of bullying needs to tell an adult in the school, tell their parents, tell a friend, and/or report it on line. Most TLDSB schools have a "Report Bullying" button on the home page of their school website where students can anonymously report if they feel they are being bullied.	Schools work to build capacity to help students deal with difficult situations. Programs in place include –  • restorative practices training,  • character development  • communications skills training  • equity and inclusion strategies  • school citizenship opportunities  • resilience training
